THE YEAR IN REVIEW

The 2023-24 program year was marked by extraordinary demand.

Literacy Pittsburgh sits at the nexus of three urgent local and national issues: the ongoing worker shortage, increased immigration, and rapid technological change. During program year 2023-24, Literacy Pittsburgh served 20% more people than the prior year, reaching 3,340 adults in our region.

The launch of a new three-year strategic plan in January set forth a sharp focus on the student experience and ensuring each student has the tools and support to reach their goals. We reorganized our staffing structure to accommodate growth and improve programming. We appointed a Director of Strategic Initiatives to oversee careerfocused educational offerings such as digital skills classes and specialized classes for healthcare. We also added new positions to our teaching team to better support classroom-based students.

Program innovations and enhancements led to increasing numbers of adults benefiting from digital skills classes (+14%), career-focused classes like math for the trades and English for health care (+9%), and career services such as career exploration, planning, postsecondary applications, and job searching (+78%).

A new beginning because of you!

Melissa went to college for education in Georgia and spent a number of years working as a loan specialist for higher education. She wanted to make a switch from customer service to something that made a bigger impact on the community.

She learned from PA CareerLink® that Literacy Pittsburgh offered free computer classes. She took many classes including Google Docs and LinkedIn. She improved her typing skills. Now, Melissa is working on earning her Microsoft Office Specialist certificate in Excel right now and plans to take the Expert



class next.

Student outcomes improved as well, with 38% more students obtaining or retaining a job, and 16% more students earning United States Citizenship than the prior year. Strong numbers of students attained their GED[®] and transitioned to postsecondary education or job training as well.

Our commitment to diversity and inclusion remained strong with regular all-staff educational programming several times a year including presentations on LGBTQ+ 101 and Building Safer Spaces at Work and in the Community. The DEIA Staff Engagement Committee has screened several films to spark discussion and create understanding. These initiatives, as well as efforts to diversify our board and staff, led us to earn a score of 84.5 on The Vibrant Index, seven points higher than last year.

This past year saw the launch of a literacy tutoring program for young children, Empowering Readers for Success (ERAS), which pairs adult tutors with children in Clairton City Schools, Catalyst Charter Academy, and Lincoln and Faison in Pittsburgh Public Schools. This exciting pilot project harnesses the power of Artificial Intelligence (AI) to evaluate the student's progress and create tailored lesson plans.

Our digital skills and career services offerings expanded significantly. You can read more about these new initiatives on page 10.

A wonderful and growing team of staff and volunteers supported students in achieving their goals and learning with us. Our staffing and volunteer corps have both grown by 11% over the past year, helping propel students toward their goals.

This growth is supported by a 16% growth in operating revenue compared to FY23 thanks to the generous

support of individual donors, corporations, foundations, government contracts, and partnerships. Our long-term sustainability grew this past year as well, thanks to a \$4 million investment in our endowment and operating reserve from an anonymous donor.

The increasingly important role of Literacy Pittsburgh and the amazing accomplishments of our students were recognized in local media with 30 earned media features over the course of the year.

We also celebrated, welcomed, and recognized the people contributing to our mission. We welcomed 16 new staff members and four new board members, Rich Fitzgerald, Michael Lamb, Steve Mazza, and Yaqi Wo. We celebrated two retiring staff members, Mary Leitao and Susan Mansuetti. We said goodbye to two board members, Keeley Baronak and Lucy Russel. We mourned the loss of former board member Patsy Smith and celebrated her life and legacy as a champion for literacy. Additionally, we celebrated Chief Program Officer Lori Como's 25th anniversary at Literacy Pittsburgh. We also celebrated numerous staff and board awards and recognitions over the course of the year. We are so proud of our team.

None of our work would be possible without you—our volunteers, our donors, our partners, our friends. Thank you for joining us in creating better lives through learning.

Elisabeta was matched with a tutor and the pair worked together until she passed the first two subject areas. Recently Elisa was able to pass the Social Studies portion, leaving her with only the Science left to go. Elisa came to Literacy Pittsburgh well prepared educationally, needing only encouragement and a few resources to achieve her diploma.

FAMILY LITERACY

Pau came to the United States as a refugee from Myanmar. She enrolled at Literacy Pittsburgh to learn English, improve her listening skills, and help her children with school. Pau obtained her citizenship last year, got her driver's license, and has been working at Giant Eagle. Her family also bought a house! She's a model student and her story has inspired other students in class to keep working hard toward their goals, too!

JEFFERSON-MON VALLEY

Xiaojing came to Literacy Pittsburgh because she wanted to communicate with people in her daily life and have the ability to search for job. Xiaojing was paired with volunteer tutor Renee. Because of their hard work and dedication, Xiaojing progressed from a Low-Intermediate level to Advanced in a little over a year. She feels comfortable talking with people she meets and has been accepted to complete a Secondary Education Master's Math program at Duquesne University.

Jerraea, a Pittsburgh native from the Northside, has been working closely with her tutor, Sarah Powell, as she pursues her goal of obtaining a GED[®] credential. Maria came to us working part-time as a hotel housekeeper. Over the summer, Maria got a job working full time at Holy Family Institute. She has worked very hard and plans to start the Upwardly Global program soon, which will help her apply her experience as an Engineer to U.S. employment.



SQUIRREL HILL

Olga and Alex are both from Russia and started working with their tutor, Melissa, in 2020. They BOTH became U.S. citizens during summer 2024!

BEAVER COUNTY -AIRPORT AREA

Shaymaa came to the United States from Iraq in 2016, a moment she describes as both beautiful and frustrating because everything was unfamiliar. She began at Literacy Pittsburgh soon after, but



had to delay her studies because she needed to work to support her family. An accident further delayed her studies. When she returned, Shaymaa enrolled in English and citizenship prep classes, becoming a U.S. citizen in 2022. "The next step was to enter the GED[®] program," Shaymaa explains. "I am proud to have passed my first subject, mathematics."

Last year, **548 tutors** in Allegheny and Beaver Counties provided **21,325 hours** to help our students succeed. **Thank you!**

BUILDING CAREER SKILLS

New offerings support students seeking employment.

Our new strategic plan outlines ambitious goals to expand our capacity to serve more students and increase persistence by reducing barriers to success. We also seek to create roadmaps that show students the way toward good careers as well as demonstrate to employers the value our students present. Literacy Pittsburgh's Student Support Services and Workforce Development teams are at the forefront of this work.

These expanded offerings helped 1,144 students achieve employment outcomes last year and 99 enter postsecondary education.

Digital Skills classes continue to grow in offerings and participation. Last year, classes attracted 541 attendees and 50 Microsoft Office Specialist certificates were earned. We are now offering Word, Excel, or PowerPoint prep classes multiple times a year and have added an Expert Level Excel certificate.

Healthcare Careers are the focus of English for Hospital Service Roles and Customer Service for Healthcare Roles to help students flourish in this high-demand field. In addition to workplace English specific to the roles, these 10-week classes offer digital skills, an opportunity to meet employers, soft skills, and job search/resume assistance.

Upwardly Global helps to bridge the gap between an immigrant's professional work experience and the American workplace. Through Upwardly Global's online learning platform, Literacy Pittsburgh can now serve more students with essential workforce education at a pace and in a setting of the student's choice. A great feature is a tool to evaluate foreign credentials.

Google Career Certificates are now available to students, staff, or tutors through Coursera to complete courses in Project Management, Cybersecurity Professional, Data Analysis, and more.

Personalized Career Advice expanded with the addition of a Career Services AmeriCorps member who can meet one-to-one with students and assist with career exploration and resume preparation.

Skill Building Workshops are offered throughout each month and many prioritize students on our waitlist so they can access vital services while waiting to be placed in a class or with a tutor. Topics include career exploration, resume basics, and navigating career changes.

Career Fairs are offered once per quarter to give students a chance to network with employers and often participate in on-site interviews. Our new student portal also lists area career fairs.





Thanks to the Pittsburgh Penguins Foundation, a group of Literacy Pittsburgh's new citizens were recently invited to cheer on our hometown team against the Detroit Red Wings. This is one of many ways that local corporations support our students.

RECRUITING AND RETAINING IMMIGRANT TALENT

Literacy Pittsburgh partners with Pittsburgh Human Resources Association

With 9.5 million job openings in the U.S. but only 6.5 million unemployed workers, companies of every size and industry face hiring challenges. Recruitment and retention are a never-ending cycle. At the same time, the Pittsburgh region has been experiencing a significant increase in immigration during the past few years.
